Since then, we suffered from the Asian Financial Crisis (1997-98) and then survived through the Global Financial Crisis (2008). The Institute of Economics was officially established on February 1, 1970. In the early years, the Institute focused its research on domestic issues. Bringing both domestic and international economists together, we undertook a series of research projects based upon economic development in Taiwan, such as "On Current Prices, The Directions and Strategies of Taiwan's Economic Development, Human Resources, Econometric Modeling of the Taiwanese Economy, Income Distribution, The Development of Taiwan's Financial Sector", and so forth. In addition to empirical studies, recently we have also placed emphasis on theoretical research. Moreover, in order to obtain a global perspective and promote interactions with international scholars, we have been organizing international conferences, and sponsoring joint research and exchange programs.

The Institute values the continuing education of its faculty members. This is done through encouraging our researchers to foreign and international research programs, as well as inviting world-renowned international guest speakers and scholars for many collaborative opportunities. We also assist local universities in graduate teaching and thesis supervising. In recent years, the Institute has participated in programs sponsored by Academia Sinica, such as "Academia Sinica Fellowships for Doctoral Candidates in Humanities and Social Sciences," "Postdoctoral Fellows Appointment," and "Visiting Fellowships for Domestic Scholars," and so forth. The institute also hosts the "Workshops on Advanced Economic Research" sponsored by the National Science Council (reorganized and became Ministry of Science and Technology on March 3, 2014). Furthermore, we start corporation with the Center of East Asian Studies, University of Chicago to hold "Taiwan Economic Research Workshop" during summer since 2015 within the purpose of encouraging collaboration in high quality research among potential Taiwanese economists.

Devoted to improving the academic performance of domestic economic community, the Institute, in addition to publishing journals and monographs and organizing conferences, also invites internationally renowned economists to sequences of seminars, such as the "Contemporary Master Economists Lecture Series" and the "Chung-Hua Series of Lectures" Besides, we have established rigorous evaluation standards for faculty appointment and promotion, which encourage our researchers to achieve a higher level of scholarly performance. As a result, many of our researchers received honors, such as the "Outstanding Scholar Awards" from the Foundation for the Advancement of Outstanding Scholarship, the "Academic Awards" from the Ministry of Education, the "Outstanding Research Awards" from the National Science Council, the "Academia Sinica Research Award for Junior Research Investigators", as well as elected "Academician" and "Young Affiliate" of The World Academy of Sciences TWAS.

In the past two decades, we have made great progress in raising our research profile. In the future, while continuing our focus on academic research, we will strengthen ourselves on public policy research. To achieve this, we will combine our expertise in economic theory and empirical methodology with our knowledge in public policies in conducting policy analysis. Our public policy research outputs are to keep the government informed in its long-term planning and policy making. In addition, while pursuing publication in international top journals, we also plan to engage in research that is relevant to Taiwan's society.

Over-the-counter (OTC) trading of securities in Taiwan was launched in February 1988 under the management of the Taipei Securities Dealers Association (the predecessor of today's Taiwan Securities Association). In 1993, the Ministry of Finance (MOF) set out to build a more robust capital market and enhance OTC trading functions. After examining the system, functions, and organizational framework of the OTC market, the MOF decided to set up an OTC center as a non-profit institution to promote the development of the OTC market in Taiwan. After more than a year of preparation, the TPEx was formally established pursuant to the Securities and Exchange Act on November 1, 1994 to take over the business of OTC trading.

Under the strategic goal of building a multi-functional, multi-level full-fledged exchange, the TPEx has remained dedicated to fostering emerging and high-tech industries, creative industries, small and medium enterprises, and micro-enterprises by providing a viable channel for public listing and capital raising. Richard Baldwin

Professor, Graduate Institute, Geneva

Richard Edward Baldwin is Professor of International Economics at the Graduate Institute, Geneva since 1991 and Director of Centre of Economic Policy Research (CEPR), London since 2014. He is Senior Editor of Economic Policy since 2014 Founder and Editor-in-Chief of VoxEU.org since March 2006. He was Visiting Research Professor at the University of Oxford from 2012 to 2015; Visiting Professor at Massachusetts Institute of Technology (Sep 2002 – Jan 2003 & Sep 1998 – Feb 1999). Previously, he was Associate Professor (1989–1991) and Assistant Professor (1986–1989) at Columbia University Business School.

He is member of the Advisory Committee of the Research Institute of Japan's Ministry of Economy Trade and Industry since 2011 and member of the Global Agenda Council on Trade of the World Economic Forum since Sep. 2009. He was Vice Chair, Advisory Committee, Peterson Institute for International Economics, Washington from 2008 to 2012, Policy Director of CEPR London, from 2006 to 2014, Scientific Committee, CEPIL, Paris from 2005 to 2007 and Co-managing Editor of the journal Economic Policy from 2000 to 2006. He was a Senior Staff Economist for the President's Council of Economic Advisors in the Bush Administration (1990-1991) following Uruguay Round, NAFTA and EAI negotiations as well as numerous US-Japan trade issues including the SII talks and the Semiconductor Agreement renewal.

The author of numerous books and articles, his research interests include international trade, globalisation, regionalism, and European integration; he has worked as consultant for the numerous governments, the European Commission, OECD, World Bank, EFTA, and USAID.

He wrote his PhD at MIT under the guidance of Paul Krugman, with whom he has co-authored a half dozen articles the most recent of which was published in 2004. His M.Sc. is from LSE, his B.A. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He was awarded Doctor honoris causa by the Turku School of Economics and Business, Turkey in 2005, the St. Gallen University, Switzerland in 2012 and recently by the Pontificia Universidad Catolica del Peru (PUCP), Peru, in October 2014.

Ping Wang received a Ph.D. degree in Economics from the University of Rochester in May 1987, being affiliated with Penn State University from 1987 to 1998 and with Vanderbilt from 1999 to 2005. He is presently Seigle Family Distinguished Professor of Arts and Sciences at Washington University in St. Louis and Research Associate at the NBER. His major research areas include Growth and Development, Money and Macroeconomics, Economic Theory, and Spatial/Health Economics. He has published over 60 research articles in refereed journals, including American Economic Review, Review of Economic Studies, Journal of Economic Theory (4), Journal of Monetary Economics (3), International Economic Review (5), and Review of Economics and Statistics (2).

He has supervised or co-supervised 22 Ph.D. and 4 M.A. students, visited the University of Rochester, the University of Washington, Purdue University, Tilburg University, the CORE, and the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas, and is a frequent visiting scholar at Academia Sinica, the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta, the International Monetary Funds Institute, Kobe University and Kyoto University. He served as Department Chair at Vanderbilt during 2002-2005 and at Washington University in St. Louis during 2005-08, Vice President of the Chinese Economic Association in North America during 1991-92, and President of the Chinese Economic Association in North America in 2001.

He is currently Vice President for Planning and Development of the East Asian Institute, Associate Editor for Economics Bulletin, Journal of Public Economic Theory, Pacific Economic Review and Regional Science and Urban Economics, and on the editorial and advisory boards for Journal of Macroeconomics, Taipei Economic Review, and American Association for Chinese Studies. His current research focuses primarily on: (i) micro-founded theory in growth and development, (ii) intertemporally and spatially redistributive policy, (iii) search and match models of labor/family, money/credit and technology, (iv) agglomeration of productive economic activities, (v) labor market consequences of addiction/substance abuse and health/human capital investment decisions, (vi) positive and normative analysis of crime, corruption, casinos and networks, and (vii) economic integration, outsourcing, venture capital and institutions.


